Retell Questions: Use the questions to prompt the child in retelling important parts of the passage after reading it.


- What does the text suggest you should do to cross a desert? Travel by camel. Pack stuff on the camel's back. Pack lots to drink.

Materials: none, just your imagination!



Using these images, pretend to be the figures (people) in the paintings.


- What are they doing in the paintings?


